

What is the Drive on the Left campaign?

The Scottish Government and Road Safety Scotland (part of Transport Scotland) have launched their Drive on the Left campaign, reminding visitors to drive on the left when visiting Scotland this spring and summer.

The campaign sets out to help drivers stay safe as they embark on their journey to Scotland, by sharing useful information about Scotland's roads, which often differ from other countries, including how to navigate singe-track roads and passing places.

Drivers are urged to stay alert and be well rested to avoid switching to autopilot, which can easily happen when the roads are quiet or a driver is tired. This can cause someone to enter a roundabout the wrong way or turn onto the wrong side of the road at a junction.

Visitors are also reminded that weather conditions can change quickly in Scotland, making it even more challenging to navigate long and twisty roads.

Drive on the Left wristbands and stickers will be distributed through the BVRLA to visitors when they collect a hire car, along with a Driving in Scotland information leaflet. The leaflet offers practical advice about driving on single-track roads, looking both ways at junctions, speed limits, planning your journey and taking regular rest stops to avoid fatigue. The wristband is available in 8 different languages.

Visiting Scotland from overseas? Remembering to drive on the left can be tricky. We'd love to know how you stay alert and make sure you keep to the left at all times. Share your top tips below!

Key messages

- For many visitors, Scotland's roads are unfamiliar and demand more concentration. Drivers from overseas are less used to driving on our rural roads, which can be long, twisty and often single-track.
- Habit determines much of our driving behaviour. If you're not used to driving on the left, it's easy to go into autopilot and drive on the right.
- It is particularly important to pay attention early in the morning or late at night when there may be no other traffic to remind you to drive on the left.
- When driving in Scotland it's important to override the autopilot and drive 'consciously' especially when entering a road with no other traffic or entering a roundabout.
- Junctions can be tricky if you're not used to driving on the left. Make sure you look both ways when checking for traffic, and turn onto the correct side of the carriageway. This can be particularly hard to remember if there is no other traffic about.

- It's particularly easy to go into autopilot if you are distracted by other people in the car, if you're tired or trying to decipher directions to find your destination.
- The weather in Scotland can be challenging. Changing weather conditions make navigating the twists and turns even more complicated, especially when it's dark and the road is unfamiliar.
- Avoid driving tired by planning ahead and taking regular breaks. If you feel tired while driving, stop for a coffee and have a rest.
