About the Drive on the Left campaign

The Scottish Government and Road Safety Scotland have launched their Drive on the Left campaign, reminding visitors to drive on the left on Scotland's roads this spring and summer.

Throughout the campaign we will work with partnership organisations and local businesses to share useful information for drivers visiting from overseas to help them stay safe on Scotland's roads, including how to navigate single-track roads and passing places.

The campaign highlights the importance of staying alert and being well-rested to avoid switching to autopilot while driving. This can easily happen when the roads are quiet or the driver is tired, causing them to enter a roundabout the wrong way or turn onto the wrong side of the road at a junction.

Visitors are also reminded that weather conditions can change quickly in Scotland, making it even more challenging to navigate long and twisty roads. Drive on the Left wristbands, available in eight languages, will be distributed to visitors via car rental companies including Hertz, Avis, Enterprise, Sixt and Europear, along with Driving in Scotland leaflets.

The leaflets offer practical advice about driving on single-track roads, looking both ways at junctions, speed limits, planning your journey and taking regular rest stops to avoid fatigue.


Key messages for drivers who are visiting Scotland from overseas


- We want you to enjoy our beautiful country safely by remembering to drive on the left.
- Driving on the left-hand side of the road requires greater concentration if you're not used to doing it not just on the first day of driving, but throughout your visit.
- It's important to drive 'consciously' and avoid switching to autopilot especially when entering an unfamiliar road with no other traffic or when entering a roundabout.
- Junctions can be tricky if you're not used to driving on the left, especially if there is no other traffic around. Make sure you look right, then left, and then do a final check to the right before making your turn. When clear, turn onto the correct side of the carriageway.




- Scotland's scenic roads can be long, twisty, undulating and often single-track.
- Single-track roads use passing places to allow vehicles to pass each other.
- If the passing place is on your left, pull in and give way to oncoming traffic.

Key messages...







Invite the front-seat passenger to act as a second 'pair of eyes' to assist driving on unfamiliar roads.

If you feel tired while driving, stop for a coffee and have a rest. Plan your journey and take regular breaks to avoid driving tired.

Look out for our Driving in Scotland leaflets and wristbands which will be distributed to overseas drivers when they collect a hire car.


